#UNEXCITED EXERCISES AND ACTIVITIES



As sex educators, we often get asked for exercises and activities to work with kids and adolescents. This question is not as easy to answer as some might wish. A method is only a method and it is much more important to be aware of what **the goal is, who the target group is, with what attitude you use the method**...

There are countless tool kits from which you can select suitable methods for the target group. But to make sure that the target group is really unexcited, you should always ask yourself some questions first when choosing exercises and activities:

- What is the aim of the method?
- Which situation is appropriate?
- What exactly does the target group need?
- What do I need in preparation?
- ▶ How do I deal with "disturbances"?
- Am I aware of my own role and attitude?
- Do I feel competent and comfortable to carry out this method and to maintain the situation?
- What is my mission and task?
- How can I be supportive for the group without bringing in my own experiences and opinions into the discussion? etc.

In general, each method must always be individually selected and adapted to the specific situation, the environment, the participants and their needs, age and interests. But we would like to show you some examples of what it means to us, to work unexcited.

How to become a hero or a heroine?

It's actually quite easy: you already are! If you don't believe, just fill out the worksheets, and find out what you already do on a regular basis to be a role model.

TRAFFIC LIGHT

A very simple and proven way to initiate discussions is to work with the traffic light system. This method can be applied in many different ways and can be easily adapted to different conditions and target groups. The basic rules are always:

I agree / I think that is appropriate ...



Well, it depends on the situation / I need more info / I am not sure ...

I do not agree / I do not think that is appropriate ...

Adapted to the situation you can work with different coloured cards, individual working sheets, with arrangements in the room etc.

And also the questions can be adapted especially to the target group, age, needs and interests. Take some time to select questions for the target group and then engage in *honest conversations. Thats what makes this unexcited.* Appropriate questions for this system allow different points of view and encourage discussion among the youngsters.





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WHAT IF ... I FEEL LIKE IF, ...

"If we learn to name our own feelings and the feelings of others from a young age, we will find it easier to create and maintain healthy relationships as adults, whether it be in a work-context, amongst friends, or in our romantic lives."

For this method, it is sufficient to think about different situations that are relevant in the environment of the target group and then to consider individually or as a group how one feels or can feel in these situations. Depending on the goal, situation and group, symbols, pictures and gestures can also be used or situations can be introduced by the participants themselves.

An important part of sexual education is to be able to perceive, understand and talk about feelings. This may seem banal, but it is an often neglected basic competence that makes it easier for us *to build and maintain consensual and healthy relationships with others*.

If we know how we feel about ourselves and how others may feel in different situations, we can better respond to our own needs and name them and we can understand reactions from others and respond appropriately. *In this way we promote dialogue and consensus. This is what makes this method so unexciting.*

And there are many many more, let's talk and discuss about it.
